Please can I take this opportunity to remind you all of our online reporting form where students can report safeguarding concerns and also discrimination of any kind, this can be found on the front page of our website.



Background Career and History

I start teaching at 23 having attended the University of Reading. My first teaching post was at Exmouth Community College up until last year when I joined HCC. I have experience of being Head of year, Assistant Principal and Deputy Head as well as continuing teaching music.

Q. What made you want to become a teacher?

A. I have always been passionate about music and taught music groups as a teenager prior to teaching. I was encouraged by an experienced teacher at University to go into teaching and to this day I really enjoy wanting to share my love of music to the new generation.

Q. What has been your favourite thing about being at Honiton so far?

A. The staff and students of HCC as well as the community have made me feel really welcome here. I loved being able to work with the students on the Christmas Concert where students were able to perform. This is an area that I am very keen to grow as it really can involve anyone who wants to have a go!

Q. What is your proudest achievement to date? (Professional or Personal)

A. On a personal note, I have 3 children who I am very proud of. Professionally- one of my music groups performed at the Royal Albert Hall in London at a national concert which was an amazing opportunity for the students.

Q. What do you hope to achieve at HCC?

A. vibrant music department which creates opportunities for everyone including students who have not had access previously to musical education, instruments or lessons. HCC has amazing facilities for music which is great for giving students opportunities to make music. Also, to bring back as many shows as we can and build a great vibe in the college for performing arts.

In the wider community, I have started to work with the Devon Music Hub to put together opportunities for all youngsters in the Honiton Community to access instrumental lessons. We have also just arranged a visit by the Devon Youth Choir leaders in April to deliver a workshop with our singers which is very exciting!

Q. If you didn't become a teacher, what career path would you have taken?

A. Musician, performer or a writer. All creative roles!

Q. Outside of teaching, what are your main hobbies and interests?

A. I like keeping active by cycling, sailing, playing music and I recently completed my compulsory basic training for riding a motorbike.

Q. If you could live anywhere in the world, where would it be and why?

A. I love Devon and was born in Devon but loved visiting Prague in the Czech Republic a couple of years ago. Maybe one day I will return there but Devon is where I am happiest.

Q. Who is your favourite musician and why?

A. I am really inspired by one of Britain's leading Classical Guitarists Gary Ryan who plays and writes innovatively. I'm learning a couple of his challenging pieces at the moment including 'Benga Beat' and 'Hot Club Francais'.

Q. What is your favourite genre of music?

A. Although I'm open to all genres of music, Jazz and Folk music and probably my go to's.

Q. Name 3 instruments that describe you

A. 1.Classical Guitar – I have played since I was 7 and it shows my creativity

2. Cello – another one of my main instruments which helps describes me as expressive

3. Trombone – an instrument I aspire to play one day and shows me as Bold (in a good way!)
